ABOUT THE AUTHOR: Diana Banks is a Mylrea through her mother's family. Several years ago, she began writing the biography of her great great grandfather, John Mylrea, who was born on the Isle of Man in 1823.

In the course of researching John's story, she became an accidental authority on a variety of Mylrea strands and she has prepared a series of short histories of these clans in an attempt to find the web that links them all together. To date, she has produced narratives about:

Her interest in the Mylreas of Lancashire was sparked by the number of Mylreas who left the Isle of Man in the mid 1800s to make new lives for themselves, the largest proportion in Lancashire. However, as this collection shows, the Mylreas had been leaving the island well before then, and were early contributors to their diaspora in this part of England.

Diana began her professional life as a teacher in central Queensland, went on to become a scholar at several Australian universities, and later a senior bureaucrat in Federal government circles. She has completed postgraduate studies at both Melbourne University in Australia and Harvard in the United States and is an experienced writer although the Mylrea stories are her first foray into biography.

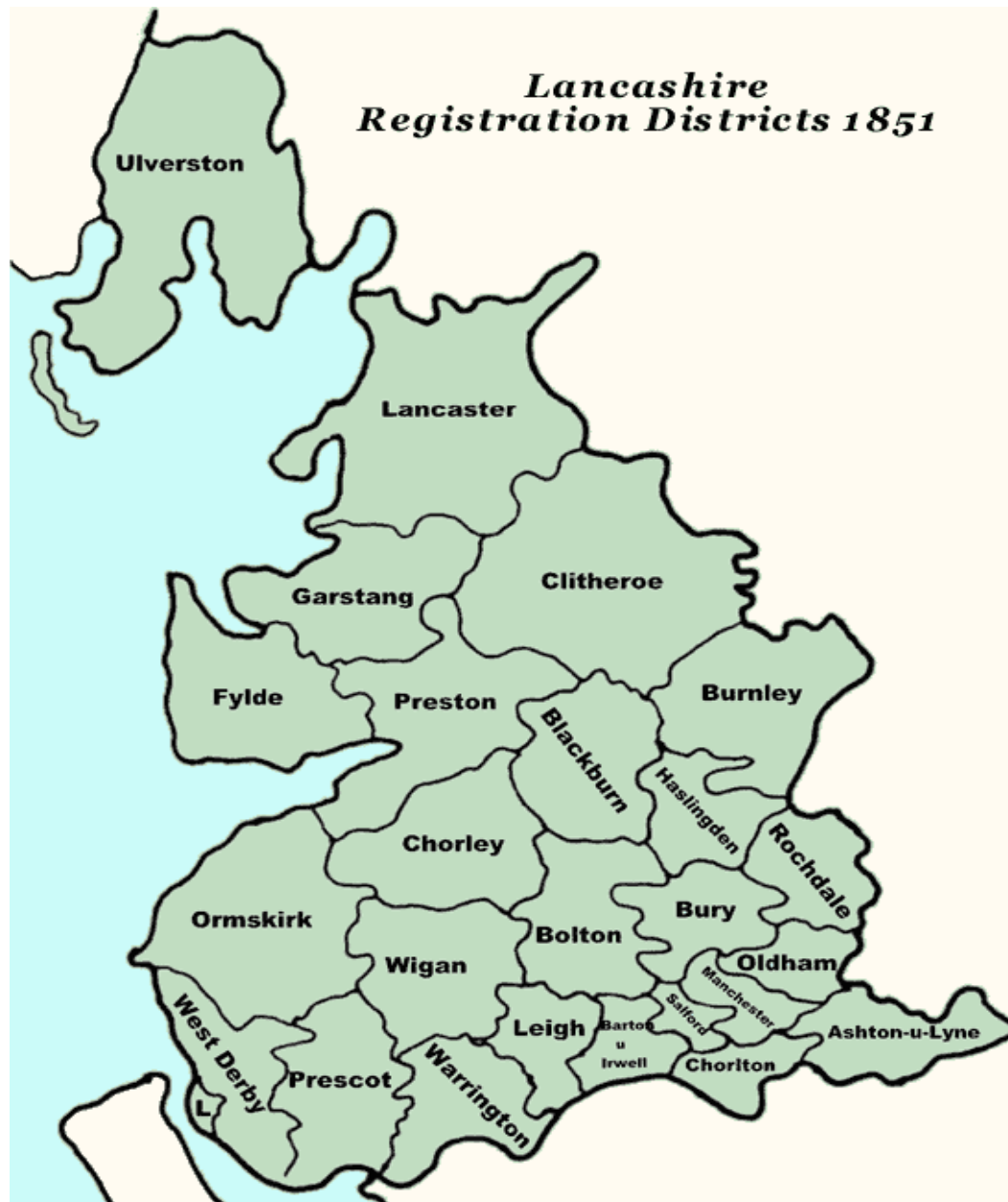
A BRIEF HISTORY

In early times, the county of Lancashire guarded England from the invading Scots. Lancaster Castle, from which the county derives its name, was built at the lowest crossing point of the River Lune, and was a key English fortification. The early history of Lancashire's is littered with conflict, York and Lancaster, Cromwell and Charles I, and parts of the Jacobite Rebellion were all played out in this County. It was also the scene of the famous Pendle Witches, and their trial in the 1600s.

Lancashire's entry onto the world stage began over three hundred years ago, when Thomas Steers cut into the rock wall protecting the "pool" and built the first dock in Liverpool, which in turn enabled a small town to grow rapidly and soon flourish as a world port, the centre of transatlantic trade. It became the port from which slave ships left to hunt along the Guinea Coast for black Africans, destined for the homes and fields of white and wealthy individuals, especially in the Caribbean. More recently, coal and the industrial revolution transformed the economy of both the county and the UK, rising to a golden age of industrial technology, only to crash in the Lancashire cotton famine, which left families across the county destitute and forced into an existence of abject poverty. Nevertheless, Liverpool grew rapidly into a busy port and ship-building city. The Industrial Age and the waves of emigrants fuelled new business opportunities as faster and cheaper ways of doing things (eg. tailoring) catered to the emerging middle classes who had funds to spare for the first time and ships were required to carry human cargo to lands of opportunity, notably New Zealand, Australia, Canada and the United States.

No doubt, Mylreas have been leaving the Isle of Man for Liverpool for centuries, the distance between the two being just a short sea crossing. Few records remain to mark the transition of these early travellers although in some cases, the city Directory tells of their enterprise. The evolving Lancashire Online Project is a rich source, and occasionally a moment of serendipity provide further detail, such as the will of William Mylrea, Archdeacon of Mann, that alludes to his son William (b 1760) who had gone to Liverpool and later died in a shipwreck, on passage between the Guinea coast and the West Indies in 1786.

A CAUTIONARY NOTE

The name MYLREA is uniquely Manx and those who found themselves in Lancashire in the late 1700s must have had their origins on the Island, even if their precise genealogy is uncertain.

What follows in this document has been constructed using a variety of resources, and while the individual pieces of information have been derived from primary sources, the groupings are largely the author's and might not have any justification other than as a matter of logic. The material has been organized into families where possible, when several generations were evident. The remaining individuals find themselves in the UNATTACHED category, awaiting the discovery of fathers, grandfathers, or children.

It is problematic to rely on records that are 200 years old (or older). From so long ago, they suffer in any number of ways. They are far from complete, since registration (birth, marriage, death) was not compulsory then. As well, the literacy levels of both recorder and reporter of parish records and census collections led to a variety of spellings, especially of a surname as unique as MYLREA. The consequence of these stumbling blocks is that some individuals included here might not actually belong to the Mylrea clan, even though their surname has a phonic similarity to 'Mylrea'..... and vice versa.

The early information in this publication has been drawn mostly from the records of parish churches, incomplete though they are. The Reform Act of 1832 was a major turning-point in British history when landowners, until then with a monopoly on political power, were forced to share the power with others, including "Town Dwellers" who for the first time had the right to vote. Thus, for the first time, their names were more likely to appear on lists other than the records of parish churches.

The Unattached

Edward & Philip Mylrea were both shipwrights at much the same time, in Liverpool. They also shared an address in Frederick Street, although not necessarily at the same time, a street near the docks, in the district now known as Merseyside. Based on their estimated dates of birth, these men were almost certainly the sons of Edward Mylrea and Susannah Cashen of Peel, on the Isle of Man.

The other Mylrea family from this early period was that of William, the bricklayer, seems unlikely to have been related to Edward/Philip Mylrea. William's family had a different "feel" about them. They lived mostly in the Burton Wood area to the west of Liverpool, were disinclined to marriage, several having children without the benefit of a wedding, and pursued a more rural existence than the shipbuilding Mylreas.

As the 19th Century gathered momentum, many more Mylreas made their way from the Isle of Man to Lancashire. The four sons of Thomas Mylrea and Elizabeth Cowin of Lonan probably left in the 1820s as young men, married and raised their families in Liverpool. The exception was their youngest son John who learned his trade as a book binder then returned to his island home.

William Mylrea the cooper from Ramsey, who had married Isabella Corkhill in Douglas in 1816, took his family to Liverpool in the early 1820s.

At least three of the children of Edward Mylrea, ship's captain, left Onchan for Liverpool. Edward, the shoemaker, with his new wife Ellen Curphy, went over in the mid-20s, and so did his sisters Ellinor who had married Richard Curphy, and Margaret who had married James Wilson.

Another William Mylrea (probably the son of William & Elizabeth Clague of Douglas/Lonan?) – a tailor - married in Manchester, and lived in Salford across the Irwell river from Manchester.
